One of our favorite dogs is being returned to rescue for the second time. This particular dog came to Taysia Blue when a good Samaritan saved him from being shot in his backyard because he soiled a rug. His next family thought they would have the time for him, but didn't. His next family seemed perfect for him, yet he didn't apparently measure up. He deserves a forever home, not just an 'until he screws up' home or an 'until we move' home or an 'until we get tired of him' home. But if we don't expect a dog to be perfect, we shouldn't expect humans to be perfect either.

When we adopt, we commit to love and care for them for the pet's entire life. When pets do things that we don't like, the enlightened, educated species should correct that behavior. It shouldn't be a one-and-done mind set. Humans seem to embrace a disposable, planned-obsolescence, fast-food, quick-gratification attitude about much in life, including our pets. Why would anyone treat a life as something that can be discarded?

Each week we stare at the rescue waiting list and match it to available foster families. We come up short. We know we should focus on the one(s) we can save, but instead our hearts ache for the ones that we can't save. Our hearts break for the shelter volunteers and staff who plead for help or receive our e-mail or calls telling them we can't help today.

Saving one at a time.... That is all any of us can do. We can't save them all, but we can save THIS one... If you're feeling a bit disheartened, a little compassion-fatigued, read this and take the words to heart. We can save THIS one.


Next year's event will be held in Sturbridge, MA, November 8-14. Save the dates and look for details after December 1st this year.
